BACKGROUND:

COMMENT:

The Bush Fires Act allows Bush Fire Control Officers to be jointly registered for more than one district, if both local authorities agree. Joint registration is

more important for those FCO's which operate in areas close to the border between local authority districts.

Even if not dually registered, a Bush Fire Control Officer has authority to operate in an adjoining district and can exercise all their powers providing that an officer or member of a brigade of the adjoining local authority in which the fire is burning is not present.

In the event that a member of the 'home' brigade is present (not necessarily an officer) they take charge and can give instructions to brigades and officers coming in from adjoining areas.



Emergency Arrangements – Incident Controller Authority

In a recent meeting with Mr Colin Brown, Fire and Emergency Services Authority, one of the matters raised for discussion related to the authority of a person in charge of an emergency retaining control of the emergency if it crosses Shire boundaries.

While the most likely emergency to cross boundaries is a bush fire, other emergencies have the capacity to do so as well, such as fire resulting from a vehicle accident on a road that forms the boundary between two Shires, a chemical spillage or lost person.

The role of Incident Controller is not recognised by legislation, although it is a practical function that is covered by the State Emergency Management Committee policies. In a fire emergency, an Incident Controller is most likely to be a Fire Control Officer, however, as an FCO, their authority terminates at the Shire boundary unless the adjoining Shire has also appointed them as an FCO. This doesn't mean that they cannot continue to fight the fire, but it does mean that their authority to issue directions ceases. A person from the adjoining Shire holding any role, regardless of experience or training, has the higher authority.

In discussing this, it was felt that the function of Incident Controller needs some recognition, and that they should retain the function of Incident Controller, until they are able or willing to hand over that responsibility to an appropriate person.

Accordingly, Council resolved at the last meeting to request adjoining Shires to adopt a position that -

The person who is in charge of an emergency, whether appointed as an FCO by either Shire or not, that crosses Shire boundaries is deemed to be the Incident Controller of the emergency, and shall remain as Incident Controller, until such time as the function is transferred to an alternative suitably qualified or experienced person.

It would be appreciated if you could raise this suggestion with your Council for discussion.

COMMENT:

I have passed on the letter from the Shire of Trayning to FESA for comment but at the time of writing this item I had received no response.

Agenda item 4.1.2 was my first solution, but the more I read Niel's letter, the more I've come to the conclusion that there are two issues. The second, being the roles and responsibility of the Incident Controller.

In my opinion, if a fire started in the Shire of Mt Marshall, the CBFCO or his Deputy would be the Incident Controller. If the fire looked like crossing into another shire he would liaise with the most senior fire officer in that shire who could then become part of the Incident Management Team. The only time I believe that the officer from the adjoining shire may indicate that he wished to take over was, if in his opinion the fire was not being managed efficiently.

FIRST AND FINAL NOTICE BUSH FIRES ACT, 1954 (as amended) Notice to all owners and / or occupiers of

land in the Shire of Mt Marshall

Fire Break Order

Notice is hereby given to landowners and / or occupiers within the Shire of Mt Marshall that firebreaks must be installed by 1 October and maintained clear of inflammable material up to and including 15 March as per the requirements in relation to Section 33 of the Bush Fires Act 1954.

Agricultural Land

Clear a firebreak consisting of mineral earth, to a width of no less than 3 metres, as close as practical, inside all external boundaries of the property.

Firebreaks must be maintained to provide a vertical clearance of a minimum 3.5 metres as to allow adequate access for fire appliances.

An approved fire fighting appliance is required to be present in any paddock where crop harvesting, straw raking or hay bailing is being carried out. The fire fighting appliance must be in a state of readiness and have a minimum capacity of 400 litres of water.

Harvesting is permitted on Sundays and all public holidays, with the exception of Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Years Day.

Town Sites

All town site lots within the Shire of Mt Marshall shall be cleared of all debris of an inflammable nature and be maintained free of such material.

Fuel Ramps and Depots

All grass and other inflammable material to be cleared from areas where drum ramps or bulk fuel are located and where drums, full or empty are stored and such areas are to be maintained clear of grass and other inflammable materials.

Variation to firebreak notices

If it is considered to be impracticable for any reason to clear firebreaks or remove inflammable material from land as required by the notice you may apply to Council or its duly authorised officer for permission to provide firebreaks in alternative positions. If permission is not granted by Council or its duly authorised officer, you shall comply with the requirements in this notice.

Harvest / Movement of Vehicle Bans

A ban on harvesting and the movement of vehicles in paddocks may be imposed when the predicted weather conditions are classified by the Bureau of Meteorology as very high or extreme, or when local conditions warrant bans to be applied.

All such bans are at the discretion of the Chief Bush Fire Control Officer or a duly appointed person.

General Provisions

Failure to comply with this notice shall subject the offender to the penalties prescribed in the Bush Fires Act 1954.

If the owner or occupier fails to carry out the work, the Local Authority may enter the land and prepare the fire breaks at the cost of the owner or occupier.

If the requirements of this notice are carried out by burning, such burning must be in accordance with relevant provisions of the Bush Fires Act 1954.

Fire Break Order

Notice is hereby given to landowners and / or occupiers within the Shire of Mt Marshall that firebreaks must be installed by 1 October and maintained clear of inflammable material up to and including 15 March as per the requirements in relation to Section 33 of the Bush Fires Act 1954.

Agricultural Land

Clear a firebreak consisting of mineral earth, to a width of no less than 3 metres, as close as practical, inside all external boundaries of the property.

Firebreaks must be maintained to provide a vertical clearance of a minimum 3.5 metres as to allow adequate access for fire appliances.

An approved fire fighting appliance is required to be present in any paddock where crop harvesting, straw raking or hay bailing is being carried out. The fire fighting appliance must be in a state of readiness and have a minimum capacity of 400 litres of water.

Harvesting is permitted on Sundays and all public holidays, with the exception of Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Years Day.

Town Sites

All town site lots within the Shire of Mt Marshall shall be cleared of all debris of an inflammable nature and be maintained free of such material.

Fuel Ramps and Depots

All grass and other inflammable material to be cleared from areas where drum ramps or bulk fuel are located and where drums, full or empty are stored and such areas are to be maintained clear of grass and other inflammable materials.

Variation to firebreak notices

If it is considered to be impracticable for any reason to clear firebreaks or remove inflammable material from land as required by the notice you may apply to Council or its duly authorised officer for permission to provide firebreaks in alternative positions. If permission is not granted by Council or its duly authorised officer, you shall comply with the requirements in this notice.

Harvest / Movement of Vehicle Bans

A ban on harvesting and the movement of vehicles in paddocks may be imposed when the predicted weather conditions are classified by the Bureau of Meteorology as very high or extreme, or when local conditions warrant bans to be applied.

All such bans are at the discretion of the Chief Bush Fire Control Officer or a duly appointed person.

General Provisions

Failure to comply with this notice shall subject the offender to the penalties prescribed in the Bush Fires Act 1954.

If the owner or occupier fails to carry out the work, the Local Authority may enter the land and prepare the fire breaks at the cost of the owner or occupier.

If the requirements of this notice are carried out by burning, such burning must be in accordance with relevant provisions of the Bush Fires Act 1954.

Note: The committee decision differs from the officer recommendation in that the committee included Boxing Day (26 December) as a total harvest ban day.

BACKGROUND:

Council's fire break order has not been amended for a number of years and with the recent changes to total fire ban legislation where Councils can control harvest and movement of vehicle bans during that period one of the stipulations is that a fire fighting appliance must have a capacity of 400 litres of water, not 200 litres as is currently stipulated by Council. Another point of discussion last year was that there was no allowance for vertical clearance.

Yet another point that needs to be discussed is as a result of Councils resolution (attachment 4.1.4) from the confirmation of the September 2010 Advisory minutes when it requested that the requirements to have firebreaks on rural properties be investigated. The resolution was included to allow investigation into the legal liability of council if firebreaks are:

- (1) Not constructed
- (2) Not adequately constructed
- (3) Not enforced by Council

COMMENT:

I have invited Mr Matt Hancock from Local Government Insurance Services Risk Management team to discuss Council's concerns on its legal obligations in regards to fire breaks on rural properties. If you feel that firebreaks on rural properties are no longer required we can amend the above recommendation accordingly.

In my opinion you could be jeopardising the safety of volunteers if you were to recommend that rural fire breaks be made non-compulsory.
